BACK TO WORK CHECKLIST

The situation surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic business shutdown is evolving and many businesses are wondering, "How can we bring workers back as safely as possible?"

This checklist is an excellent start. In can be incorporated into existing health & safety inspections and supplemented with guidance from the CDC and other health authorities.

WORKPLACE SAFETY PRACTICES

- Encourage employees to check themselves for symptoms, and to stay homewhen not feeling well
- O Educate employees regarding best practices for hygiene in the workplace
- Perform routine environmental cleanings of office, including high-touch surfaces
- Perform enhanced cleaning and disinfection if an employee is suspected or confirmed to have COVID-19
- Take immediate steps to protect workers who are exposed to COVID-19 in the workplace
- O Provide masks, gloves, and other protective equipment
- To the extent possible, implement social distancing requirements for the workplace, and consider staggering shifts and other practices to lower the risk of contact/exposure

CLEANLINESS

You should ensure that public surfaces such as counters, doorknobs, and elevator buttons are regularly disinfected!

Have you reviewed the cleaning measures to ensure that high risk contact areas and touch points are being regularly disinfected?

For disinfection, diluted household bleach solutions, alcohol solutions with at least 70% alcohol, and most common EPA-registered household disinfectants should be effective. Diluted household bleach solutions can be used on hard, non-porous surfaces. Ensure proper ventilation.

Have you followed CDC guidance for cleaning and disinfecting soft (porous) surfaces?

For soft (porous) surfaces such as carpeted floor, rugs, and drapes, remove visible contamination if present and clean with appropriate cleaners indicated for use on these surfaces. Use products with the EPA-approved emerging viral pathogens claims.

Have appropriate items been laundered following CDC guidance?

If the items can be laundered, launder items in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions using the warmest appropriate water setting for the items and then dry items completely. Do not shake dirty laundry; this minimize the possibility of dispersing virus through the air. Clean and disinfect hampers or other carts for transporting laundry according to guidance above for hard or soft surfaces.

HAND HYGIENE

Have you alerted all staff members to follow the CDC recommended hand washing protocol?

Does the hand sanitizer to contain at least 60 percent alcohol content?

Public Health authorities suggest if hand sanitizer is used it needs to contain at least 60 percent alcohol content—most contain 60 to 95 percent. However, if hands are visibly dirty, always wash hands with soap and water.
